

# **Reception News**




This term the children have been learning all about growing and focusing on plants and animals. The children explored wer Putcatand ogandbrekenthe a story called 'Stuck' and 'Jack and the Beanstalk'. Whilst these have been our focus books the children have also had opportunities to explore books about Spring and how plants grow. The children have done some amazing writing about our story 'Stuck', writing about objects that they would throw into the tree. They also created pictures to match their writing. The children looked at parts of a plant and what the parts are called in relation to our story 'Jack and the Beanstalk'. They also grew a beanstalk which they thoroughly enjoyed and have watched their plants closely. The children have been so engrossed in all their spring learning and have enjoyed all the exciting opportunities.

#### Year 6 News

Since we are almost at the end of this term, we have decided to write a newsletter page about what we have been learning. Therefore, come with us on this journey to discover the wonderful things we have done.

# Geography

During geography, we have studied the USA, including labelling the different states and looking at population. Also we have been learning about the hottest place on earth- Death Valley- and we have written a non-chronological report. Additionally, we have taken a brief look at New York, doing a practice non-chronological report. With some encouragement from our teachers, we produced great work.

# DT

In DT, we have been planning and making Ferris wheels. We cut our pieces of wood and coloured them together with our lollipop sticks. We then put the pieces together with a glue gun. Lots of students really enjoy this topic.



# PE

In PE, we have been learning various sports such as handball, football, dodgeball and gymnastics. Being able to learn many different sports safely and responsibly is excellent as we are also having fun. In gymnastics, we have many different activities to do such as jumping off apparatus tables and landing on mats. To make sure we stay fit, we do Active Fit on the days we don't do PE.

# RE

In RE we have been learning about Christianity. In Christianity we have learnt about Jesus and have looked at stories like The Lost Sheep. We've also learnt about people that influenced the people alive today. Two of these people are Rosa Parks (who stood up for black people's rights) and Martin Luther King Jr.

# Reading

In reading we have enjoyed our class texts and independent reading. Alongside, we have been practising comprehension skills to help prepare us for our SATs. Moreover, for homework, we have been doing texts in our homework book. If we made a mistake, our teachers will clearly explain the answers to us.

# Computing

In computing, we have been learning about spreadsheets. All students have been learning how to read and answer questions about information represented on a spread-sheet. We are also learning about how to show information on a spread-sheet. The main spreadsheet we have been looking at is Microsoft XL spreadsheet.

### Art

This term in art, we used different types of material to create fantastic designs of landscapes inspired by the artwork of Carol Nelson (*see the first image below*). Our first lesson was about painting on unique materials. For example, bubble wrap, paper, felt, cardboard, cotton balls, tissue paper, and foil. We drew a perspective picture and made/ painted our landscapes. We cut up different material and added them into place to give texture. Our teachers then gave us a choice of adding salt or rice to give a perfect finishing touch. In the next lesson, we painted our landscapes giving the materials an excellent depth of colour.



#### RHE

In RHE we have been learning about Online Safety, for example: not talking to strangers; going to bed on time and not being on your phone very late. This is important because if we're just talking to random people and going to bed late whilst being on our phones, it can be dangerous and unhealthy for us as we're kids. Another way for us to stay safe online and make sure we're okay is using Childline. Childline is a place where you can talk about anything to someone and it's confidential - meaning no one else will know. It is open 24 hours a day, and their phone number is o800 1111.

## Spanish

This term, in Spanish, we have been learning to describe a monster. Prior to this, we learnt the names of different animals. Furthermore, we learnt to say phrases in Spanish. For example, "Una mariposa pequeña y azul" translates into "A small blue butterfly." In addition, we named clothes, parts of the face and parts of the head.

## SPaG

In SPaG, we have been doing 10-minute tests to practice our SPaG and to enrich our education. Furthermore, in SPaG we have also learnt about punctuation, spelling, pronunciation and the various types of mood. For homework we have been doing prefixes and tenses.

#### Maths

In Maths, we have been doing word problem sheets, which contain questions such as: ratio, pie charts, fractions, percentages, shapes, proportion, algebra and coordinates. We have also been doing old SATs papers for practise as homework. These homework papers help us to revise for our future SATs and prepare us for secondary school.


## Conclusion
