Writing





The Writing Process

- Teachers prepare a model text
- This text is designed to interest and excite the children. It is often based on the class text or the topic that is being taught to the children

The text included grammar, spelling or vocabulary that is expected to be used by the children in the year group



Lesson 1

- The class read the whole model text together
- Teachers and the children discuss the genre and features associated with the genre. Look for examples together and underline/highlight
- Children are also shown high quality examples of writing features appropriate to their year group (e.g vocabulary, sentence openers, conjunctions)
- Children can highlight/underline genre features in the text





Lesson 2 and onwards- the writing process

- The class work through the text a paragraph a day
- Read the paragraph altogether with teachers pausing to discuss ideas and features included in the texts (e.g vocabulary, punctuation, sentence structure)
- Class discussion about the key points from the paragraph.
- Discuss ideas that the children can use from the model and alternatives
- Children or teachers make notes on whiteboards



Standard writing lesson cont'd

- For some groups/ages, the model will be removed from board before this stage.
- When needed the model can be left to support when the children are writing
- Share steps to success with class at start of writing process
 - discuss key areas





Independent Writing

- Children write their own version of the paragraph using their notes
- Teacher to continuously support children when writing. They use lots of praise and encouragement.
- At times, teachers will discuss opportunities to improve writing as a class
- Examples of successful work will be shared and celebrated with the class.



Marking

- Teachers will mark the children's writing (either with the children or after the lesson)
- Green highlighters are used to highlight examples of excellent writing choices in children's work
- Pink highlighter are used to show where children can make edits to improve their work
- Children then use a purple pen to edit their work. They look to the pink and work to make further improvements on their writing



Handwriting

- Throughout the school handwriting is taught every day
- Handwriting is taught in a logical order with children learning how to confidently form letters accurately before they move on to joining letters
- Teachers model handwriting in every handwriting session and throughout the school day



Grammar

- Children are taught grammar in a fun and engaging way
- We enjoy lots of grammar games and interactive ways to teach grammatical concepts
- Fast-pace grammar sessions take place at the start of every writing session
- Year group appropriate grammar ideas are used and discussed in the model text





Spelling

- Year group word lists are used for handwriting at the start of every day in KS2
- Handwriting rules are taught weekly and children given the opportunity to work on them throughout the week in their own writing
- Handwriting words are sent home on a weekly basis
- Handwriting tests take place on a weekly basis after children have been exposed to the words through the week
