What a busy term! This term we have been talking about People Who Help Us. We started our topic by reading the traditional tale of *The Three Little Pigs* and introducing the job of the construction workers. Then we used the book *Dig, Dig, Digging* to learn how community vehicles help us, such as diggers, rescue helicopters and lorries. The week after we introduced the *Little Workmates* book series and focused on doctors, nurses and teachers. The focus was then moved to police officers and firefighters and all children enjoyed role playing these characters. We also had World Book Day and dressed up as our favourite characters from different stories and Red Nose Day where we learned how by dressing up in red and donating money can help children who are less fortunate than us.

Children also created beautiful daffodil cards for Mother's Day and to thank them for all they do for us. Our book *The Smartest Giant in Town* introduced us to rhyming words and also how to be kind and helpful to others. Finally, we introduced the season of Spring and we learned about the Christian festival of Easter and the Muslim festival of Eid. We read the story of *Webster J Duck*, about a little duckling who hatches out of his egg and then goes looking for his Mum. We wore odd socks for World Down Syndrome Day and learned that we are all a bit different and being different is a great thing to be! We had lots of fun making chocolate egg nests and made repeating patterns using eggs and other shapes for maths.

What a busy term we have had! The children have been enjoying our topic- Come Outside! Our core texts this term have been: *Stuck* by Oliver Jeffers and *Jack and the Beanstalk*. We have been using story maps and actions to remember our stories. The children have been doing some superb writing, including writing the story of *Jack and the Beanstalk*. They are getting good at using their 'Fred fingers' to pinch the words that they want to write.

We have also been learning about plants and how they grow. The children planted their own beans and have enjoyed watching the different stages of growth in the classroom. We have also been observing seasonal changes in our garden. The children have enjoyed seeing flowers sprouting and blooming. We have also been talking about how we can care for our planet by recycling. The children in Reception looked amazing on World book day! It was so lovely to see everybody dressed up as their favourite storybook characters. Our key author for world book day was Julia Donaldson. The Reception Team enjoyed sharing their favourite Julia Donaldson books with the children.

In Maths we have been revisiting concepts that we have already learnt. The children have been working hard. We have revisited length and height, using the vocabulary "long, short and tall". We have also been mastering our knowledge of numbers to 10, comparing the different numbers using the vocabulary "fewer, more than and same"

The children have also created some beautiful finger paintings inspired by the work of Brazilian artist, Romero Britto






Year 1 News



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Year 1 have had another fantastic term! The children have been working incredibly hard across all subjects and have enjoyed continuing their learning about Dinosaurs.

In Writing, the children created their own non-chronological reports based on a dinosaur of their choice. They enjoyed researching their chosen dinosaur and then used this to complete their own Dinosaur booklet. They really enjoyed this unit and were very proud of the final outcomes.

In History, the children have continued to enjoy learning about Mary Anning and her discoveries.

In Science, the children have been learning about the season of Winter. They engaged in activities around this, including completing a daily weather chart and designing their own Winter jumper to write an advert about.

In Art, the children have been learning about patterns. They have looked at natural and man-made patterns and had a go at creating their own patterns. They then applied this knowledge to a piece of artwork inspired by David Hockney, our artist for this term.

In DT, the children designed and made moving vehicles. They used a range of resources to build their designs. They then added wheels to their vehicles with support from an adult. The children really enjoyed this project and are looking forward to the next.

In Maths, the children have started measurement. They have learnt how to use rulers to measure a variety of objects in centimetres.

We have been blown away by the children's effort this term and are looking forward to welcoming them back after the holiday.

Luckily, we managed to make it in time for the changing of the guards! We could hear the marching soldiers and the pipes and drums, and then we saw them march proudly into the castle gate!

While at Windsor Castle, we also had a session learning all about how castles changed over time, what they were for and what they were made from! Did you know that William the Conqueror was the first to build Windsor Castle almost 1000 years ago? At that time, it was made of wood!

We were also able to go through the state apartments and see Queen Mary's dolls house, which is 100 years old! The children were amazed at the working lights and all the small parts.

The Year 5 teachers have had the pleasure of meeting most of you and telling you how hard your children have been working this term. The children of Year 5 have shown themselves to be hard-working, respectful and aspirational. The effort they all put into their work truly reflects an outstanding desire to learn and develop their understanding of a wide range of subjects and topic areas.

So, what have been the highlights of this term? The children have enjoyed building upon their historical knowledge of the next phase of British history after the Romans left Britain and the Anglo-Saxons established themselves. They can now tell you about how fresh invaders, in turn, came to threaten the Anglo-Saxons powerbase in the form of the Vikings. WORLD BOOK DAY

On the 7th of March, we all (most of us at least) dressed up in amazing costumes from our favourite books to celebrate this year's World Book Day. I dressed up as Tom Riddle – Lord Voldemort – from the Harry Potter series, with his pet snake, Nagini. At the end of the day, all three classes learnt a bit about the late Benjamin Zephaniah, an astounding children's poet. As Wolf and Bear class were reciting poems of his, Lynx were learning about his life and inspirations. Bear read out `De Rong Song,' a poem about always focusing on the good things in life. Meanwhile, Wolf were practising my personal favourite, `Talking Turkeys,' which was written by Zephaniah with the intention of spreading the word of veganism to a wider audience. At the brink of home time, the classes recited poems to the parents who had come to collect their children.

RED NOSE DAY/COMIC RELIEF
