School News

Nursery News

We enjoyed welcoming more new friends into our Nursery in 2024. We sang lots of familiar Nursery Rhymes such as *Humpty Dumpty* and *The Wheels* on the Bus to help our new friends settle in. We now have two very busy classes in Toadstool and Fern. This term our Topic "Oh the Places You'll Go!" took us to *The Zoo, On a Bear Hunt,* to *Where the Wild Things Are* and for a *Walk through the Jungle.* We have been practising recognising and using numbers up to 5 and have been exploring shapes by creating shape monsters. In RE we have been learning about how different people around the world celebrate their New Year and enjoyed making dragon puppets and moving like dragons for Chinese New Year! We listened to the story *The Colour Monster* and learned about how different emotions can be different colours and talked about how they can make us feel... (yellow=happy, blue=sad, red=angry, green=calm, black=fear, pink=love) Then we painted our own colour emotion monsters. We've enjoyed playing in the cold weather outside (good for helping us become more independent with our coats and hats), exploring the ice and making our winter tree sparkle with ice, frost and snow. We've enjoyed our Library trips, PE with Mr Woodward and Music with Mrs Jalland too!









Reception News

Our topic this term has been 'Night-time tales and my community'. One of our focus books has been, 'Whatever Next' by Jill Murphy. The children were inspired by the story to consider what it might be like to zoom up into space in a rocket. They worked collaboratively to create a night sky by using different shapes and tools. Our topic display board looks out of this world! The children also retold the story, ordered story pictures and labelled them. Some children even wrote sentences to accompany the story pictures.





Our other focus book, 'All Through the Night' by Polly Faber and Harriet Hobday introduced us to night time professions. The children enjoyed talking about what they want to be one day. We have some aspiring nurses, ballerinas, footballers and teachers!

In Design and Technology, the children had the opportunity to learn how to weave. First, they used paper to create a place mat and then they used a needle and wool to sew around a planet shape. The children enjoyed weaving outdoors and used pieces of material to weave through the fencing panels in the garden.



In addition to all our busy classroom activities, Reception joined the Nursery children for some delightful singalong sessions. Mrs Musset played her guitar and various teachers led action songs for the children to sign and sing. The Reception children were assigned houses and participated in their first KS1 house event. Each child made a handprint of the colour of their house. All the handprints will be used to create a large house banner.

Year 1 News

Year 1 have had another fantastic term.

Our topic this term is 'Dinosaurs'. The children have enjoyed learning about Mary Anning and her discoveries. As part of our dinosaur topic, the children had a go at digging in sand for 'dinosaur bones'. They then had to work in teams to create a dinosaur skeleton using the bones that they had found. They had so much fun!

We have enjoyed reading our class text 'The Girl and the Dinosaur', by Hollie Hughes and Sarah Massini, and writing our own narratives inspired by the book. The children designed front covers for their narratives and each class will be making a book that will be kept in the infant library for all of the KS1 children to enjoy. The children engaged with drama sessions based on the narrative



In Science, the children have been learning about Animals. They have explored the different animal groups, the features of different animals and used vocabulary such as carnivore, herbivore and omnivore to discuss animal diets.

In Geography, we have been learning about the United Kingdom. The children have looked at maps of the United Kingdom and identified the countries within the UK and capital cities of each of the countries.

In Art, the children have been learning about collage. The children designed their own dinosaur collages and then



made them using coloured paper. The children really enjoyed these activities and the results were fantastic!

Year 2 News

It has been a busy term for Year 2 and we have been impressed with the children's aspiration (our term's value) in their learning.

Our topics have included Journeys in History and we have started studying Zambia in Geography.

For Journeys, we looked at famous journeys including sea voyages, flights and the Moon landings. We also read the books Journey by Aaron Becker and Astro Girl by Ken Wilson-Max, which helped inspire our writing. A highlight was the Year 2 children visiting some of their old classrooms and teachers in Reception to read their stories to the younger children.

In maths, we have been practising using money and are now investigating multiplication and division.

Other projects have included programming the Bee-Bot robots in Computing, creating animal collages inspired by the work of contemporary artist Victoria Carter, and making some fantastic foam puppets in DT. The Year 2 team have also loved seeing some of the amazing puppets, drawings and other work that the children have produced at home. Well done Year 2 and we hope you have a good half term break.



Year 3 News

This has been a brief yet busy half term in Year 3. Our topic for most of the term has been North America. We looked at the physical geography of North American countries and explored the differences between selected states in the USA. We then wrote a wonderful narrative inspired by a Native American myth - The Crow's Tale.

Anderson Baptist Church welcomed us for an engaging session about miracles. RE Inspired, a local charity, spoke to us about miracles, shared some stories and we completed fun craft activities. All the adults in Year 3 were incredibly impressed with the way that the children conducted themselves on the walk there and then whilst in the church. It was a great afternoon out!

During nutritional learning we designed and made pizza faces. In the kitchen, we used our knowledge of cooking preparation and kitchen safety to make our pizzas. Back in the classroom, we then designed and made our pizza box. We tried to include a catchy name, the ingredients we used and a food label.





Giant ball runs, was the focus of outdoor learning this term. We spent time working as a team, to use given resources to create a giant ball run. This activity really helped our problem-solving skills, and our ability to use trial and error and evaluation to complete a practical challenge. We used lots of different resources such as tubes and crates to build our life-size ball run.






Introduction

At the Anderson Baptist Church, the entire year group learnt more about what Christians believe about death and dealing with grief. It was a fun, interactive learning experience and allowed us to be creative and inquisitive as we furthered our understanding of this most sensitive of life experiences.

Our achievements

Throughout the term, we have continued to work hard as we gear ourselves up for our end of key stage assessments (SATs) whilst also deepening our knowledge and understanding across the curriculum. We have learnt a great deal about the biology of animals and how this compares to ourselves, as well as how we can impact our own health through the dietary choices we make. More recently, we have begun to explore the fascinating continent of North America in geography.
