# **School News**

#### **Nursery News**

What a busy term! This term we have been talking about 'People Who Help Us'. We started our topic by reading the traditional tale of *The Three Little Pigs* and introducing the job of the construction workers. We also used story maps to help us retell the story. Then we used the book *Dig, Dig, Digging* to learn how community vehicles help us, such as diggers, rescue helicopters and lorries. The week after we introduced the *Little Workmates* book series and focused on police officers and firefighters. The focus then was moved to doctors and nurses and all children enjoyed role playing those characters. We also had **World Book Day** and dressed up as our favourite characters from different stories. On **Red Nose Day** we learned that by dressing up in bright colours and donating money, we can help children who are less fortunate than us.

Children also created beautiful rose cards for Mother's Day and to thank them for all they do for us. We looked more at the season of Spring and painted beautiful daffodils. We also planted lettuce, radish, courgettes and beans in our garden and are looking forward to seeing them grow! We learned about the Christian festival of **Easter** and the Muslim festival of **Eid**. We read the story of *Webster J Duck*, about a little duckling who hatches out of his egg and then goes looking for his Mum. We had lots of fun making chocolate eggs nests and made repeating patterns using eggs and other shapes for maths.











WOW, what a busy term we have had in Daffodil class!

Our core text has been We're going on a bear hunt by Michael Rosen. We enjoyed learning the story through sensory experiences. Some children remember repeating phrases and actions from the story and joined in at each carpet time. We have also enjoyed reading *Me and the family tree*' by Carole Boston Weatherford, encouraging children to talk about members of their own family and identify their different features.


In Maths this term we have continued to practise our rote counting, numeral recognition and understanding quantity. We have also been working on understanding length (keywords: long and short) and creating repeating patterns.

Each day the children have practised their fine motor skills to develop their grip and pencil control. We have also enjoyed our bucket times, experiencing lots of fun sensory activities like playing with slime, shaking flour and making shaving foam go splat!

This term we have learnt about so many different celebrations. The children enjoyed a yummy pancake snack for **Shrove Tuesday**. We read our favourite books on world book day. The children had a colour party and special gulab jamun snack to celebrate **Holi**. We created beautiful handprint cards for Mother's Day. Our children have made cards and lanterns for **Eid**. Finally, we had an egg hunt in our garden to celebrate **Easter**.

As days have become warmer our children have enjoyed playing in the garden more, exploring our sand and water trays as well as riding our bikes and cars. We have developed our gross motor skills by doing lots of climbing on our climbing frames and running around playing chase!









# **Reception News**

What a busy term we have had! The children have been enjoying our topic- 'Come Outside!' Our core texts this term have been: *Stuck* by Oliver Jeffers and *Jack and the Beanstalk*. We have been using story maps and actions to remember our stories. The children have been doing some superb writing, including writing the story of *Jack and the Beanstalk*. They are getting good at using their 'Fred fingers' to pinch the words that they want to write.

We have also been learning about plants and how they grow. The children planted their own beans and have enjoyed watching the different stages of growth in the classroom. We have also been observing seasonal changes in our garden. The children have enjoyed seeing flowers sprouting and blooming. We have also been talking about how we can care for our planet by recycling. The children in Reception looked amazing on **World book day**! It was so lovely to see everybody dressed up as their favourite storybook characters. The Reception staff all read their favourite books to the children.

In Maths we have been revisiting concepts that we have already learnt. The children have been working hard. We have revisited length and height, using the vocabulary 'long, short and tall'. We have also been mastering our knowledge of numbers to 10, comparing the different numbers using the vocabulary 'fewer, more than and same'

The children created some wonderful beanstalk collages inspired by the Jack and the Beanstalk story.

#### Year 1 News

Year 1 have had another exciting term of learning.

In Writing, the children have been reading *The Girl and the Dinosaur* by Hollie Huges and Sarah Massini. The children have enjoyed engaging in activities around this book. They planned and wrote their own narratives inspired by the narrative structure. We have been really impressed with the enthusiasm the children have shown towards their writing. The children then designed front covers for their story.

In Science, the children have been learning about 'everyday materials'. They have learnt about the properties of materials and why different materials are used for different purposes. The children enjoyed carrying out an investigation to see what material would be best suited to make an umbrella for the class teddy.

In Geography, the children have been learning all about the countries in the United Kingdom. Your child has learnt about the capital cities of England, Northern Ireland, Scotland and Wales and identified physical and human features of these locations.

In History, the children have been learning about 'Dinosaurs and Fossils'. They have learnt about Mary Anning and the importance of her discoveries. They completed a timeline of the key events in Mary Anning's life. They also discussed the difference between fossil hunting in the past and present.

In Art, the children have been looking at the work of David Hockney. The children have explored pattern and how Hockney uses this in his work to add detail and to create a more abstract effect. The children practised pattern and then used their skills to create their own art inspired by David Hockney.

In DT, the children enjoyed participating in this term's DT Day making moving vehicles. The children carefully planned their ideas and then spent the day using recycling to bring their ideas to life! The children thoroughly enjoyed DT Day and are already looking forward to next term's topic.

We are really proud of all that the children have achieved this term. We hope they have a lovely break and we are looking forward to welcoming them back in the Summer Term.

Year 2 News

It's been a very busy term in Year 2! Miss Ahmed, Mr Chan and Mr Higgs have been very impressed with how hard all Year 2 children have worked in all their subjects. We have even had three school trips or visits to support our learning this term and the teachers would like to congratulate all the children on their excellent learning and behaviour.

January was off to a squirming start with our reptile visit, which supported our science topic of Animals Including Humans. Tom, the owner of Tom's Reptiles, brought in all sorts of reptiles for us to learn about and hold. We were also lucky enough to meet some insects, which were described by the children as having "Sticky feet!"

In maths, we have focused a lot this term on multiplication and division. In the past few weeks, we have moved on to measurement – length, mass and volume.

In writing, we have recently focused on our history topic of the monarchy and geography topic of London. We used lovely books such as *The Queen's Hat* by Steve Antony and *Katie in London* by James Mayhew to not only learn about our topics but to do beautiful descriptive and narrative writing.

Our recent trip to Windsor Castle was a huge success! The children were excited to visit a real castle, and they hoped to say hello to King Charles III. While his standard was flying, we sadly weren't able to see him, but we had an exciting day. We toured the grounds, seeing guards on patrol, the church where Queen Elizabeth II is buried, the famous doll's house and the stunning rooms in the keep. While there, we also learnt about castles, why they were built, how they could defend against attackers and we even besieged one!















In the wider curriculum, Year 2 have learnt about algorithms in computing by programming their own Beebots to complete a set of tasks. In PE we have been developing teamwork and problem solving in outdoor adventurous activities. We got to visit the local church as part of our RE topic on Easter, and the children were described as "Eager, well-behaved and polite" by the volunteers there, so well-done Year 2 for representing Alfred Sutton so well! Excitingly, we get to finish off our D&T 'Nutritional Learning' topic in the final week of term by creating a yoghurt pot that the children designed themselves. A great end to a fantastic term. We would like to wish all of Year 2 a wellearnt rest and we look forward to seeing you all next term!

#### Year 3 News

Well done Year 3 for all your hard work this term! Thank you to the parents and carers for helping so many children make great progress in learning their times tables using 'Times Table Rock Stars' and also with encouraging their reading by reading daily at home. In school, the children have been continuing to practise hard at their written methods for the four operations; essential skills for then going on to problem solving. Our work in English has been inspired by *The Firework-Maker's Daughter* by Philip Pullman and has led to children producing some beautiful firework descriptions as well as some thoughtful writing in role as characters from the story. Well done for hard work in also practising handwriting skills.

In our science topic on 'Animals including Humans', the children have been learning about the different types of skeletons different animals have and how they support functions of the body.

It has been Rabbit class's turn for swimming lessons and all children have done really well at improving their water confidence and skills.



We hope all the children have a good break and look forward to seeing them back in the summer term, when we will also start our new history topic on Ancient Greece.



# Maths
