Transition to school



- Transition is very important. We want your child to feel happy and confident in their new environment and with new staff.
- We offer a range of transition events to help children and families feel settled and secure.
 These may include welcome meetings for parents and stay-and-play sessions for children.
- For children starting Reception, staff also contact and visit children's previous settings to learn more about their interests and needs.





Preparing for nursery



5 Steps to Prepare Your Child for Nursery Class

- **1. Talk about nursery in advance:** share excitement about new friends and fun activities. Visit the nursery together if possible.
- **2. Establish a routine:** practise daily habits like brushing teeth, getting dressed and saying goodbye to build confidence.
- **3. Arrange playdates:** help your child get used to playing, sharing and taking turns with others.
- **4. Get your child excited:** show photos of staff and classrooms. Talk about the fun activities they will do.
- **5. Attend open events:** explore the environment together, meet staff and ask questions.

Early Years Foundation Stage



The EYFS is based on four principles:

The Unique Child
Positive Relationships

Enabling Environments

Learning and Development

- Every child is unique and individual and will make progress at different rates.
 Positive relationships and enabling environments will stimulate children's curiosity and help them thrive, learn and develop.
- These principles underpin all aspects of teaching and learning in the Early Years Foundation Stage.

The characteristics of effective learning underpin learning and development across all areas of learning and support the child to remain an effective and motivated learner.






Learning in the Foundation Stage



- There are 7 areas of learning and development.
- These 7 areas are used to shape our education programme and determine what children will be learning.
- Each of these areas is as important as the other and all are interwoven.
- They are split into Prime and Specific areas.





The Role of Play



Play is central to the EYFS, helping children to learn in a natural, engaging way.

Through play, children develop creativity, imagination and problem-solving skills.

Play encourages children to explore, take risks, and build independence and confidence.





Learning in Nursery and Reception



- Skills, knowledge and vocabulary are taught progressively throughout the year so children build firm foundations for future learning.
- Carefully planned topics are designed to spark curiosity, introduce new ideas and extend children's vocabulary.
- High-quality books are carefully chosen to link with themes and inspire a wide range of rich learning experiences.
- Adult-led teaching provides structure and introduces new concepts in small groups and whole-class sessions.
- Continuous provision allows children to practise and apply their learning through purposeful play.
- **Skilful adult interactions** extend children's thinking, deepen understanding, and support problem-solving.





The Learning Environment



- Welcoming, safe and stimulating spaces where children feel secure.
- Indoors and outdoors used equally to provide rich learning opportunities.
- Resources are accessible and inviting, promoting independence and curiosity.
- Supports children's social, emotional, physical and cognitive development.
- Carefully designed to spark curiosity and support a love of learning











The school day - Reception



A typical school day:

- 8.30am School gates open stay with your child until the classroom doors open.
- 8:40am Classroom doors open please say goodbye in the playground and do not enter the classroom.
- **8:50am** Class doors close and the register is taken. Children arriving after the doors have closed will need to be signed in at the office and will be marked as late.
- **9:00am** Morning learning sessions inc. phonics, carpet time, small group adult-led activities, child-initiated learning and snack.
- **11:50-12:50pm** Lunch and playtime
- **12:50-1pm:** registration and mindfulness
- **1pm** Afternoon learning sessions inc. carpet time, small group adult-led activities, child-initiated learning and storytime
- 3.10pm School ends.

Collection - wait in the outside the classroom and your child will be sent to you.

Please do not come up to the classroom door.



Phonics and Maths



- We teach children to read using the systematic phonics programme Read Write Inc. Phonics.
- This is a complete phonics programme which helps all children learn to read fluently and at speed so they can focus on developing their skills in comprehension, vocabulary and spelling.

- We use the White Rose scheme of work to teach Maths.
- White Rose teaches children
 mathematical concepts through
 pictorial, practical and written methods
 to develop a deep understanding in
 Maths and improve fluency.







Learning partnership



How to support your child with their learning:

Ensure you child is in school and on time (8:50)

- Each week, on Tapestry, you will receive an **overview of your child's learning**, giving you a glimpse of the activities and experiences they have enjoyed in school. This will also include **ideas for simple**, **engaging activities** you can do at home to build on their understanding.
- Children will also visit the **school library once a week** and choose a picture book to share with you at home.
- Reception: Once your child is settled, they will bring home a **reading book** and reading record. This book is for you to enjoy together. Please write a short comment in the record so we know they have read at home.
- Working together in this way helps to build a strong link between home and school, supporting your child's **progress and love of learning**.

- Change into PE kit in school if they have an extracurricular sport club
