Transition from Reception to Year 1



- Transition is very important. We want your child to feel happy and confident in their new environment and with new staff.
- In Year 1 children will continue child-led learning during the Autumn term. They will gradually transition into more formal lessons with input and individual tasks.





The school day



A typical school day:

- **8.30am** School gates open stay with your child until the classroom doors open.
- 8:40am Classroom doors open. Please do not enter the year 1 or 2 building.
- 8:50am Class doors close and the register is taken. Children arriving after the doors have closed will need to be signed in at the office and will be marked as late.
- 9:00am The morning includes lessons in phonics/reading, writing and maths. During the morning, there is short Activefit break and a mid-morning playtime.
- **12:00-1:00pm** (Year 1) 12.10-1.10pm (Year 2) Lunch Break
- 1pm The afternoon includes wider curriculum lessons and reading for pleasure
- **3.10pm** School ends.

Collection - wait outside the classroom and your child will be sent to you.

Please do not come up to the classroom door.

- No hoodies!




PE kit

Phonics and Maths



- We teach children to read using the systematic phonics programme Read Write Inc. Phonics.
- This is a complete phonics programme which helps all children learn to read fluently and at speed.
- Once children have completed the RWI Programme (usually in Year 2), they move onto Whole Class reading session.

 Phonics

- We use the White Rose scheme of work to teach Maths.
- White Rose teaches children
 mathematical concepts through
 pictorial, practical and written methods
 to develop a deep understanding in
 Maths and improve fluency.
- It uses the CPA approach (Concrete, Pictorial, Abstract)





Reading at Alfred Sutton



- Your child will bring home a reading book and a reading diary every day.
- Books are chosen to match your child's reading level.
- Please make sure both the book and diary come back to school each day in a suitable bag.
- A new book cannot be given if the old one has not been returned.
- Children should read at home every day and read aloud to an adult at least three times a week.
- Please write a short comment in the diary each time your child reads to you.
- Once a week, your child will bring home a library picture book to enjoy and share with you.
- All Year 1 children will take the Phonics Screening Check in June. Some Year
 2 children will re-sit it. More details will be shared nearer the time.







How to support your child with their learning:

Ensure you child is in school and on time (8:50)

Homework

At the beginning of each term, the children will bring home a homework grid. This will outline what the children have been learning as well as weekly tasks that the children can engage with at home. The children will be given homework books to use to complete these tasks.

Topic homework will not be marked but will be celebrated in class.

Regularly

- Read for at least 10 minutes
- Review number skills (times tables, division, number bonds...)
- Spelling Year 1 or 2 Common Exception Words
- Have conversations about their learning.
